
Richardson Altrusa's book club, also known as the Altrusa Wine and Chocolate Literary Society or AWCLS, met June 23. Kay George and Jan Skinner led the discussion of **Death of Santini**, by Pat Conroy.

Pat Conroy's father, Donald Patrick Conroy, was a towering figure in his son's life. The Marine Corps fighter pilot was often brutal, cruel, and violent; as Pat says, "I hated my father long before I knew there was an English word for 'hate.'" As the oldest of seven children who were dragged from military base to military base across the South, Pat bore witness to the toll his father's behavior took on his siblings, and especially on his mother, Peg. She was Pat's lifeline to a better world—that of books and culture. But eventually, despite repeated confrontations with his father, Pat managed to claw his way toward a life he could have only imagined as a child.

It is an act of reckoning, an exorcism of demons, but one whose ultimate conclusion is that love can soften even the meanest of men, lending significance to one of the most-often quoted lines from




Pat's bestselling novel *The Prince of Tides*: "In families there are no crimes beyond forgiveness."

At the July 28 AWCLS meeting, **Diane Davidson** will lead the discussion of **1st to Die** by James Patterson.

Four women--four friends--share a determination to stop a killer who has been stalking newlyweds in San Francisco. Each one holds a piece of the puzzle: Lindsay Boxer is a homicide inspector in the San Francisco Police

Department, Claire Washburn is a medical examiner, Jill Bernhardt is an assistant D.A., and Cindy Thomas just started working the crime desk of the San Francisco Chronicle. But the usual procedures aren't bringing them any closer to stopping the killings. So these women form a Women's Murder Club to collaborate outside the box and pursue the case by sidestepping their bosses and giving each other a hand. The four



women develop intense bonds as they pursue a killer whose crimes have stunned an entire city. Working together, they track down the most terrifying and unexpected killer they have ever encountered—before a shocking conclusion in which everything they knew turns out to be devastatingly wrong. Full of the breathtaking drama and unforgettable emotions for which James Patterson is famous, 1st to Die is the start of a blazingly fast-paced and sensationally entertaining series of crime thrillers.


## PILLOWS, PASTRIES, PACK-PACKS, PATRIOTISM, PINOT & MORE

The 2013-2014 Community Outreach Committee surveyed members' interest in a one-day, hands-on project to provide fellowship among members and support to the community. The Committee chose to expand a pillow project that was successful a few years ago with a local women's shelter. They chose the New Beginnings Center which provides temporary shelter for up to 36 women at a time who have left an abusive situation or almost 500 women annually. Funded primarily by grants and donations, New Beginnings provides parenting classes and group discussions that help clients understand the circle of violence, learn how to stop abuse, and prevent its recurrence. The Center also furnishes job leads and has a children's playroom where a male mentor works with the children, showing them that not all males are violent or abusive and helping them regain trust in men.

The shelter coordinator was delighted to hear our proposal. Many clients come to the shelter with nothing but the clothes they are wearing. Because women entering the shelter often have young children, we also wanted to include something for the children. Our goal was to provide 100 personalized, decorated

pillowcases-25 girls, 25 boys, and 50 adult pillowcases -a lofty goal but our members were up to the challenge. Many yards of colorful, printed, and solid-colored fabrics were purchased to handmake unique and fun pillowcases ranging from superheroes to sports and princesses to playful animals for the kids. Hand-made, quality, personalized, pillowcases will also comfort adults. The "special touch" placed on all 100 pillowcases included an Altrusa iron-on logo on the inside cuff, sealing the pillowcases with the Altrusa spirit.

The Committee decided to plan a fun social party as well as a unique hands-on service project with food, bakery items, and beverages for all who participated. And the "Pillows, Pastries & Pinot Party" was born! But we did not stop there...

As excitement for the project grew, Education Committee members were working on literacy backpacks for a Summer Enrichment and Reading Program at RISD Terrace Elementary School and adding their effort to the pillow project would increase the impact of our one-day project. Twenty-five backpacks (a.k.a. Pack-Packs) were donated by Blue Cross Blue Shield of Texas; they were filled with Pre-K and First-grader books along with school supplies, such as

construction paper, activity books, stickers, crayons, scissors, pencils, sharpeners, wipe-on board with markers, and bookmarks for the 5-6 books the children were given to start their home libraries. The "Pillows, Pastries, <u>Pack-Packs</u>, & Pinot Party" was born. But, we didn't stop there...

The International Relations Committee was planning to observe International Day of Families (May 15) and Military Spouse Appreciation Day (May 9). They had projects in mind, but needed a venue. It was a nobrainer to add them to our event. The Committee offered attendees the opportunity to write cards of encouragement and thanks to troops stationed abroad as part of the Operation Write Home Campaign. In addition, gift bags were assembled for relatives of



wounded military staying at Fisher House, a facility that provides free temporary lodging for families of patients at the Dallas VA Medical Center. So, the "Pillows, Pastries, Pack-Packs, <u>Patriotism</u> & Pinot Party" was born. Surprisingly, we were still not done....

Other members were coordinating a teddy bear collection/donation for the local police department but were re-directed to the Child Advocacy Center of Collin County, whose mission is providing safety, healing, and justice to children victimized by abuse or neglect. Contact was confirmed with the Director of Community Resources and a stuffed animal collection was initiated. The members, excited about the pillow project's development, wanted to add the stuffed animal collection to the festivities. AND... A food, toiletry, and diaper collection was already underway for a local food bank, NETWORK of Community Ministries, to address an urgent need for said items so they joined in as well. And so... the "Pillows, Pastries, Pack-Packs, Patriotism, Pinot & More Party" was born!

On May 9, 2014, stations were set up at Friends Place Adult Day Services for each of the five projects: Pillowcase Decorating, Enrichment Backpacks, Military Greetings and Care Packages, Teddy Bear Collection, and Food/Toiletry Collection - along with a food and beverage station! In all, 33 members congregated to decorate pillowcases, fill backpacks, write military note cards, fill military spouse care packages, cuddle stuffed animals, and organize food/toiletry items while enjoying dinner and pastries and sharing vino and laughter. Thirteen members who could not attend the party donated supplies. A total of 48% of our 90+ members participated. Approximately 230 volunteer hours were dedicated to the projects and expenses totaled \$1,375, paid for from proceeds of our successful fundraiser, Outstanding Women of Today... Builders of Tomorrow Annual Awards Luncheon.

Looking back, after the recipients were chosen and everything was gathered, decorated, personalized. stuffed, organized, and delivered, we accomplished our goal of a one-day, hands-on project that provided camaraderie and fellowship for our members while serving diverse segments of our community. New Beginnings thanked us for the 30 pillows and 100 pillowcases that will comfort their clients and give them a little something to call their own—making a positive impact on over 100 shelter clients and sharing the Altrusa spirit. Twenty-four at risk children specially chosen by Terrace Elementary teachers were recipients of the Summer Enrichment Backpacks. Fisher House received bath and body gift sets for 36 military spouses in honor of Mother's Day and Military Spouse Appreciation Day, while 45 cards of gratitude and support were sent to military personnel in Afghanistan through the Operation Write Home campaign. Child Advocacy Center of Collin County received 48 teddy bears tagged with Altrusa Richardson labels, reading "Roses are red, Violets are blue, Altrusa cares a lot about you", and 27 donated stuffed animals. NETWORK of Community Ministries welcomed the donation of four cases of diapers and 11 pounds of canned meats and toiletry items. We continue to establish and sustain strong partnerships with these organizations as we educate them about Altrusa's motto - Leading to a Better Community® - One vision... One project... One day... One person... at a time.









## PARTNERING WITH FISHER HOUSE TO SUPPORT MILITARY FAMILIES

A "home away from home", Fisher House provides free temporary lodging for families of VA patients who are receiving health care at Dallas VA Medical Center. Fisher House is operated by Fisher House Foundation. In 2013 alone, Fisher House Foundation saved families more than \$35 million in lodging cost, plus food and transportation .

Fisher House's services benefit the families of military and help military vets worry less that, because of their medical issues, their spouses and children do not get enough attention and the love they deserve. However, Fisher House Foundation cannot do it alone. The help of the community is needed to support their programs - especially in our area. ## **COMMITTEE DELIVERS A WHOLE HERD OF STUFFED ANIMALS!**

On May 23, 2014, Jan Skinner and Kay George, members of the Community Outreach Committee, visited the Children's Advocacy Center of Collin County (CACCC) to deliver close to 100 teddy bears. The project was on the agenda of Community Outreach to collect the bears, from both members of the Club and to use the 2013-2014 funds budgeted for this project to purchase additional bears.

Jan and Kay met with **Erica Stanley**, Director of Community Resources for the Center, who led them on a tour of the facility and provided information on the services offered. Every day, children victimized by abuse come to CACCC where they are helped through the nightmare of abuse and neglect. The mission of CACCC is to serve children who law enforcement sees – whether in domestic violence or violent action is which law enforcement is called. The agency serves children up to 18 years of age.

Providing help for these children is a team effort and under one roof they house law enforcement, child protective services, therapists, caseworkers, interns, nurses, and volunteers. They also work hand-in-hand with the District Attorney's office. The team provides safety for families, as well as support and resources they need to finally begin to heal.

Every child (age appropriate) receives a stuffed animal. Our Club's contribution will last about a month. They have a supply room in which shoes, clothes, accessories, and books are available at no charge to the children that CACCC serves. Typically, each child

### ALTRUSA RICHARDSON TO PROVIDE "CHOOSE KIND" LIBRARIES

In May, the International Relations Committee received a \$1,800 grant from the International Foundation to fund a brand new project called "The Choose Kind Library, sponsored by Altrusa International of Richardson".

Members of the International Relations committee, with **Bobbi Klein** as project leader, are busy working with Terrace Elementary principal, **Sharon Newman** and school librarian, **Leah McDonough** to open the first library by this fall. The grant should allow us to add two schools within a short time after. Our goal is to eventually provide similar libraries in as many RISD schools as possible. A list of books has been compiled and will be ordered to soon allow Terrace the benefits of this type of library. We have the benefit of partnering with the organizers of the first Choose Kind Library, who are excited by seeing their idea spread to other schools.

The project was inspired by "The Choose Kind Library @ LHE", which opened this spring at Lake Highlands Elementary. A quote from the original Choose Kind Library organizers: "The purpose of the Choose Kind Library is to utilize literature to encourage a deeper understanding of and compassion for our differences in order to foster a community of acceptance, empathy and inclusion."

On May 29, Bobbi Klein and Jane Tucker attended the Choose Kind Library open house, which was held to inform members of the community on how and why the LHE Choose Kind library was established. This project started because April Gorman read the book Wonder by R.J. Palacio when her son was in the hospital for surgery to treat a facial deformity. Another mom, Amy Daryani, read the book, and was also taken with its message. The two women came up with the idea of starting the Choose Kind Library at their children's elementary school. The books in this library have been so well received by the children, the school has taken the idea one step farther to have their 2014-2015 school theme "Wildcats Choose Kind", with all types of activities planned to encourage a community of acceptance.

The possibilities of this program are very exciting and we can envision the project opening areas of involvement by the entire club. By its nature, the project lends itself to more visibility for our club in the community.

## **THE ALTRUSA COLLECT**

The Altrusa Collect is recited at the beginning of each board meeting. In Christian liturgy, a **collect** is both a liturgical action and a short, general prayer. In the Middle Ages, the prayer was referred to in Latin as *collection*, but in the more ancient sources, as *oratio*. In English, and in this usage, "collect" is pronounced with the stress on the first syllable.



Susan Allison, Assistant Director of Library Services and former Richardson Altrusan, has been appointed Director of Library Services for the City of Richardson effective July 1, City Manager Dan Johnson announced. Allison will assume the position from Steve Benson, who is retiring at the end of June.

"Susan has been a tremendous asset throughout her years of service to the City and will make a great addition to the Department Director team," Johnson said. "Building on our solid reputation for quality service at the Library, we are excited about Susan's leadership and innovation as we move into the next era of library services."

As Director of Library Services, Allison will oversee all aspects and functions of the Richardson Public Library, which has a collection of more than 253,000 items including books, periodicals, audio and video media. The Library staff is composed of 30 full-time employees and 42 part-time employees.

"I am honored to be able to serve our community as Library Director," Allison said. "This is an exciting opportunity and I look forward to leading a staff that shares a sense of pride and ownership in what they do for our patrons."

Allison joined the Richardson staff in 1983 as a Children's Library Assistant and was named Children's Librarian in 1987. She was promoted to Youth Services Supervisor in 1995 and was promoted to Assistant Director of Library Services in 2008.

Allison has played a key role in the development of several innovative programs at the Richardson Public Library including: Digital Drop-In, Books-by-Mail, Lapsit, Explorers, Young Authors & Illustrators, and Read for Others. She is co-author of Journey to Gameland: How to

Make a Boardgame from Your Favorite Children's Book and Creature Features: a Program Guide for the Texas Reading Club.

Allison grew up in Richardson and graduated from Berkner High School. She received a bachelor's degree in education from Baylor University and a master's degree in library



science from the University of North Texas. She also earned a graduate certificate in local government management from UT Dallas' School of Economic, Political and Policy Sciences. After serving on the steering committee for Richardson Reads One Book, she served as president and is currently a member of the board of directors. She has served on numerous advisory boards and committees including the Texas Library Association (TLA) Lariat Reading List committee and the Christina B. Woll Memorial Grant committee for TLA. She is a member of the American Library Association, Public Library Association, TLA, American Libraries Service to Children, Young Adult Library Services Association, and the Library Leadership and Management Association.

Allison is a graduate of Leadership Richardson Class XII and served as a leadership advisor and on the curriculum committee. She was a nominee for Outstanding Woman of Achievement by Altrusa International of Richardson, received the Billye Meyer Distinguished Service Award/Civil Servant from the Richardson Jaycees, and the Siddie Joe Johnson Award (Outstanding Children's Librarian in Texas) from the TLA.

## **TEACHAITI TO BUILD NEW SCHOOL**

On June 7, 2014, Altrusans Linda Craft, Diane Davidson, Bobbi Klein, and Jane Tucker attended a luncheon sponsored by friends of TeacHaiti to allow founder Miquette Denie McMahon to showcase her new project- a new school. It will be located in St. Michel which is in north-central Haiti. This town has a population of 120,000 with an 80% unemployment rate. Most of the people live in substandard houses and make a living by farming. Currently over 40% of the children in this town do not attend school.

TeacHaiti has had a small school in St Michel since 2007 and currently has 80

children being educated through scholarship sponsorships. The new school (*I-r*) Diane Davidson, Bolis due to open in 2015 and will not only allow more children to attend school but it will also create new jobs in this area. The school is being designed to not only have classrooms but will also have playgrounds, gardens, a clinic, and a guest house. It will not only be a gathering place for the community but also help improve community morale and play a crucial role to instill the importance of education in this community.

The pictures of St Michel and its children that were shown in a slide presentation were very enlightening and moved all of us attending to talk with Miguette about to how our club can help her with this school. In one picture a young boy was not in school because he had no shoes. Something so simple, yet in so many countries such as Haiti a barrier to getting an education. After talking to Miquette, our club members came up with several projects to help her. The first is to have a book sponsorship drive to create the library in this new school. Our goal is to get members to donate 90 books, basically a book from each member. Miquette said a library of this size would be a huge help to the school. The other project will start in the spring with a shoe drive through an organization called Think Kindness which motivates random acts of kindness in school assemblies all around the United States. They have a worldwide project to collect new and gently used shoes to send to countries such as Haiti to give children such as the young boy in Miguette's picture the shoes he needs to allow him to go to school.

The quality of education at the School of Hope in Haiti is amazing. In 2013, 100 % of their 6<sup>th</sup> grade students passed the National Competency Exam, which is quite an accomplishment. The goal for the new school in St Michel will be to provide this same type of quality education to even more children in Haiti to ultimately change even more lives – one child at a time.

## AN AWESOME KEYNOTE SPEAKER; A GREAT SERVICE PROJECT

The Assistant Superintendent, **Dr. Jan Hungate**, of West Independent School District, gave an awe-inspiring speech! She took us through the aftermath of the tragedy, in which a fertilizer plant blew up, killing 15 people. Can you imagine having all but one school building destroyed?

This "unexpected challenge" in West taught everybody a lesson in perseverance and the generosity of America. One nearby school donated the use of their building to West. Grand Prairie donated portable buildings that they weren't using any more to West. The community of West became even closer-knit. One individual, who had no children and lost everything, worked tirelessly toward the recovery. The Altrusa International Foundation (disaster relief) donated \$6,000 and the Waco Club donated \$7,500.

The theme of West became "Rise Up" and the school board met on a Sunday after the explosion where there was an air of cooperation from everyone present. They are still struggling in some ways but they are more

importantly surviving the devastating blast and rebuilding to become a stronger community.

Hungate, a native Texan, earned the undergraduate degree from Texas Tech University. She received her master degree an education administration and doctorate degree from Tarleton State University. She has taught every grade from kindergarten to higher education in her 42 years of her career. She believes in giving back: among her many activities is as the presiding officer of Texas School Health Advisory Council promoting student health through school-based initiatives.

The <u>District Nine Service Project</u>, Altrusa Partners in Education teacher supply collection, included 256 kids prizes, 265 snacks, 200 hand-sanitizers, 150 reams of copy paper, over \$250 in cash donations and over 2,280 individual school supplies items for the Austin Club to benefit Austin ISD Title I schools located in under resourced communities serving predominantly economically disadvantaged students.

#### ALTRUSA INTERNATIONAL ASKS FOR MAKE A DIFFERENCE DAY PROJECTS

The fourth Saturday in October is designated as Make A Difference Day. This is the day when we all come together at the same time to make a difference in our communities on a national day of helping others.

## What is Make A Difference Day and what does it have to do with Altrusa International?

Founded by USA Weekend Magazine and its partners, Make A Difference Day is a national day of doing good... a celebration of neighbors helping neighbors. Every year up to three million people participate worldwide.

Altrusa, as an international organization, has participated in Make A Difference Day activities since 1997 and has been the recipient of a \$10,000 cash award on two separate occasions. This money went into the Altrusa International Foundation which in turn came back to the local clubs.

## What do we want to achieve by participating in Make a Difference Day?

Create community awareness of Altrusa.

- ♦ Show Altrusa's international focus on literacy.
- Increase the number of clubs participating in Make A Difference Day projects by 20%.
- Increase the number of clubs putting literacy as the focus of their Make A Difference Day projects by 20%.
- Increase the number of clubs participating in Make A Difference Day activities with other community organizations by 20%.
- ♦ Receive \$10,000 cash award.

#### Make a Difference Day Timeline

<u>June/July:</u> Evaluate your community needs and design a project with a literacy focus. Ask for club buy-in and encourage member participation.

<u>August:</u> Assign chair to head project. Begin event preparation and encourage members to get involved.

<u>September:</u> Begin advertising your event and seek community support. Update club on progress and encourage member participation. Involve your ASTRA members.

October: Finalize your plans and send pre-report to International office. Hold your event on the fourth Saturday in October with as many club members as possible participating.

November: Send final Make A Difference Day report to



International office by designated due date. Include photos.

#### Questions about Make A Difference Day

Why is it important that my club project have a literacy focus?

With such a strong focus on literacy, Altrusa International chose this to be the theme behind our entry. By having one theme or focus we present a united front showing that Altrusa International has joined together to help stamp out illiteracy in our communities. This is a step to help us secure another cash award while at the same time showing our passion for this cause.

#### Why can't we hold our project on a different day?

The fourth Saturday in October is designated as Make A Difference Day. This is the day when we all come together at the same time to make a difference in our communities. If we all work on different days we lose the effect and the purpose of a "national day" of helping others.

#### Why do we have to submit a pre-report?

This gives the International office staff an idea of how many clubs are expected to participate in activities. The pre-report should be a brief overview of your plans.

## Why do we have to report our project to the International office by a certain date?

In order to have your club's project included in the Altrusa entry, your information must be received by the International office by a certain deadline to give the staff time to compile everyone's information into one report. All information will be on the International website and your report can be filed online.

#### Why should I care about Make A Difference Day?

Altrusans are all about service and making a difference in our communities, large or small. Participation in the national Make A Difference Day event is just another opportunity to do so on a grand scale and to show our neighbors Altrusans do make a difference.

Remember, regardless of your project plans, large or small, whatever you decide to do will make a difference to someone!
