

Coming up on November 17 is the discussion of The Language of Flowers. Vanessa Diffenbaugh's mesmerizing, moving, and elegantly written debut novel. beautifully weaves past and present, creating a vivid portrait of an unforgettable young woman whose gift



for flowers helps her change the lives of others even as she struggles to overcome her own troubled past.

This selection is a New York Times Best Seller. The Victorian language of flowers was used to convey romantic expressions: honeysuckle for devotion, asters for patience, and red roses for love. But for Victoria Jones, it's been more useful in communicating mistrust and solitude. After a childhood spent in the foster-care system, she is unable to get close to anybody, and her only connection to the world is through flowers and their meanings. Now 18 years old and emancipated from the system with nowhere to go, Victoria realizes she has a gift for helping others through the flowers she chooses for them. But an unexpected encounter with a mysterious stranger has her questioning what's been missing in her life. And when she's forced to confront a painful secret from her past, she must decide whether it's worth risking everything for a second chance at happiness.

RICHARDSON PUBLIC LIBRARY BOOK ROTATION TO CONTINUE

The Senior's Committee has decided to include the Richardson Library Book Rotation on our list of activities for 2014-2015. The Exchange Club of Richardson has once again agreed to be our "muscle" and help us load and unload books at the various facilities.

The next rotation will be on Saturday, November 8. We at need at least four Altrusans (the more the merrier) to come to the employees' entrance to the library between 9 and 9:15 A.M. The library will not be open to the public at that time, but someone will be at the south entrance to direct you to the room where you will receive instructions. You will only need to commit to about two hours total.

The Richardson Public Library Book Rotation is a project that began in 2002, when the Library received a state grant to provide large-print books and books-on-tape to the growing Richardson Senior population. Since that time, on a quarterly basis, Altrusans have helped move the books between senior

living residences that signed up for the Book Rotation program. This program provides a constant rotating supply of books to seniors in Richardson, whether they live in a senior facility or visit the Richardson Senior Center. While on their delivery routes, the "Book Movers" are warmly greeted by avid readers who are looking forward to a new batch of books.

R-Time is not currently in all the RISD schools, but the plan is to add several each year until all schools have the program.


EXPANSION OF OUR CHOOSE KIND LIBRARIES IS IN PLANNING STAGE

The International Relations Committee has been in contact with two schools, Northlake and Forest Lane, where we are planning to start new Choose Kind libraries. These locations were recommended by the Executive Committee of RISD. A grant from Altrusa International to fund three Choose Kind libraries this club year was received in June. The Choose Kind Libraries are intended to provide books to promote inclusion, cultural awareness, equality, and empathy among elementary school children. Each library will have a special section inside the school library and with a 24"x 30" sign designating this as "The Choose Kind Library @ [school name] A Special Project of Altrusa International of Richardson Foundation, Inc." Book plates similar to the sign will be in each book.

The first library is in Terrace Elementary, since it has been our adopted school for more than 10 years and we have such a good relationship established there. Principal **Sharon Newman** and Librarian **Leah McDonough** were thrilled when we proposed this addition to the school

library. Books were ordered and delivered before the 2014-15 school year began. A picture of the delivery of the first set of books to Terrace was in the RISD Times. Though the Choose Kind Library books have been available for the children to read, we have not had an official "Grand Opening". We are working with the school to do this soon. Ms. Newman



has expanded curriculum for the whole school to include the reading of the same Choose Kind book at each the grade level. Incentives have also been instituted to encourage reading of the Choose Kind books and information on the library has been included in the morning announcements.

ALTRUSANS DONATE TOYS FOR NETWORK TOYLAND EXPRESS

INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ELIMINATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

On November 25, 1980 the ruler of the Dominican Republic, Rafael Trujillo, ordered the three Mirabel sisters brutally assassinated. Because these women were activists on women's rights, November 25 was selected as an annual day to raise awareness on violence against women in all countries around the world.

Violence against women and girls is one of the most widespread human rights problems in our world today. According to a 2013 study, 35 percent of women worldwide have experienced either physical and /or sexual violence.

This year, November 25 and the following days which are called the 16 Days of Activism against Gender Violence will be used to plan activities to mobilize and call attention to the urgent need to end violence against women. Appropriately, the 16 days end with the UN Human Rights Day on December 10. UN Women (formerly UNIFEM) uses this time to

coordinate the social mobilization campaign called Say No-Unite to End Violence against Women, this year commemorating its 18th year anniversary.



As part of this year's theme "Orange the World in 16 Days", the UNITE Campaign is extending the Orange Day throughout the 16 Days of Activism.

One way Altrusans can join in the campaign to raise awareness about violence against women is to wear orange, the official color of the UNITE campaign, to our November 20 dinner meeting. The UN Women are encouraging groups to submit a photo with the message "We wear orange because..." to raise global awareness.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH COMMITTEE DONATES MUCH-NEEDED ITEMS

Coordinator, **Tuccoa Polk**, was very appreciative to receive the donation and said that personal care items are in short supply and the agency is always in great need of them. Tuccoa explained that because the agency serves many young women with children, feminine products and diapers are often requested and sadly, many times NETWORK does not have any to give.

Personal care items are often not thought about when making donations; however, they are some of the most

meaningful basic needs items that impact daily lives. Can you imagine not having such a basic item when you need it, and not being able to afford them for yourself or your children? What a terrible feeling that must be. Fortunately for most of us, we have not experienced such a feeling and thanks to this very worthy community service project, a few other women and mothers will not have to suffer that dreadful feeling, at least for a little while. Tuccoa wants you to know that your generous contributions have made a great difference in the lives of the people NETWORK serves and that she knows she can always count on Altrusa Richardson to help. JUDGES FROM THE COMMUNITY CHOSE FIVE OUTSTANDING WOMEN OF TODAY

Altrusa Richardson thanks the judges for their time and dedication in reviewing all 27 nominations and selecting this year's honorees: The judges are leaders from a variety of professions and have had significant experience in all the award categories. Nomination packets include a nomination write-up, two letters of recommendation., and a biography. The nominee's name is redacted from all judging material. The judges evaluate every category of nomination. If one of the nominees is from a judge's company or organization, that particular judge will recuse himself/herself from that category.

Each judge completes an evaluation of each nominee. Then, the judges meet with the Judges Committee Chairs, all the ratings are combined, and final decisions are made. Special Report VOICES AGAINST VIOLENCE

The Girl Guides and Girl Scouts have created a global community committed to end violence against girls and young women. The major part of this co-educational program is a non-formal educational curriculum developed in partnership with UN Women. Through this program over five million children and young people in over 100 countries will take part in "Voices against Violence".

This program has been developed in partnership with the Word Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts and experts in gender based violence. The curriculum, which has been designed into various age groups from 5 to 25 years, has been adapted for different cultural, social and legal contexts and has already been successfully piloted in 20 countries worldwide. The course can be run over a period of six or more weeks, or can run during a camp or conference, or can even be available online. This program gives young people the expertise they need to understand the root causes of violence in their communities, to educate and involve their peers and communities to prevent violence and to learn where to access support if violence occurs in their environment.

It is hoped this program will play a big role in not only ending violence against girls and young women but also allow an avenue in which to address the problems of violence against girls and young women. More information about this program is available at stoptheviolence@wagggs.org.
