#### Make A Difference Day Project — A Rousing Success

Up to and on Make a Difference Day (MADD), the Sophomore Sisters collected 2,152 gently used books. At the urging of our recently departed sister Kathy Yates, we made the military the primary recipient and, in conjunction with Operation Paperback, shipped 47 boxes containing 847 books to soldiers both home and overseas. In addition, we donated:

350 books to the Veterans Administration Hospital;

332 books to Network of Community Ministries (Network);

290 to Genesis Women's Shelter;

201 books to the USO at DFW Airport:

84 children's books to Network; and

48 books to a Spring Valley UMC member who is preparing gift boxes for her son, a military squad leader in Afghanistan, and his squad members.

Also, we donated 7 boxes containing about 150 books for the Kindness Action Ninja project.

Our wonderful Kindness Ninjas are at it again! With a recently funded \$1500 grant from Altrusa International, and help from our members, we have set a goal to prepare 200 care packages! The "Kindness Ninjas Go Global" care packages will lift spirits and provide a touch of home to troops overseas. Service members endure severe hardship and sacrifice. Loved ones left behind also sacrifice, with precious little time for all the respon-

sibilities of child rearing and household upkeep - often for months and years at a time. There are thousands of deployed troop families in our community and we feel our care packages will provide an invaluable patriotic service.

Club members will collect or donate materials and snacks to fill as many boxes as we can with available monies. Please see the suggested items below to guide you while shopping. If you can get 50 or 100 (or more) of one item that's terrific, but we do ask that you bring at least 10. One member is knitting wool caps to include for cold nights in desert regions. The idea for this project came from one of our newest members, Kathy Yates, who recently passed away. It will be an emotional and poignant way to memorialize her short time with us.

On April 6, 2019, our members will gather at Friends Place at 9:00 am to fill, seal, address, and mail the boxes. Notes of encouragement will be included (with deepest thanks for their service) from the Kindness Ninjas of Altrusa Richardson.

#### **SUGGESTED ITEMS:** SNACKS — Salty and Sweet

COOKIES — plain/iced oatmeal, raisin, peanut butter, sugar and molasses, homemade or store bought

CRACKERS — no saltines, but Trisket, Chickn-in-a-basket, Ritz, Wheat Thins, etc.; Chips in cans; cheese crackers

FRUIT SNACK — (Resealable bags) dried banana chips, apple slices, apricots; golden raisins; freeze dried berries; Trader Joe's fruit tapes

NUTS — cans or small individual sleeves of mixed nuts, honey roasted peanuts, almonds, pistachios, macadamias, sunflower or pumpkin seeds

 ${\it DIPS/CONDIMENTS-small\ cans\ of\ bean\ or\ cheese\ dip}$ 

MEATS/FISH —Slim Jims or other individual packaged beef (no pork); non-perishable beef jerky or beef sausage; (make sure labled USDA Beef); Quality canned sardines, smoked oysters or clams

BEVERAGES/SOUP — (to mix with water or milk) instant breakfast; Gatorade/sweetened drink mixes, water enhancers (liquid or crystal); instant coffee or cocoa, lemonade, tea bags, creamer; soup in a cup

CEREAL — (small 6 /8 packs) Frosted Flakes, Trix, Cheerios, Nuts & Honey, Honeycomb

ENERGY/PROTEIN BARS — granola bars, small bags of trail mix (no chocolate), snack cakes

ENHANCERS — to mix with MRE's (Meals Ready to Eat), ramen noodles, seasoned salt, packets of hot sauce, mustard, relish, ketchup; taco seasoning for meat or chicken

TOILETRIES — toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss piks; cotton swabs, shaving lotion, disposable razors, shampoo, small packages tissues; individually packaged baby wipes, eye drops, lip balm, lotion; aspirin and other pain relievers; feminine hygiene products; zinc oxide crème in tubes; moleskin, foot powder

ENTERTAINMENT — paperback books, current magazines, comic books, word games, crossword puzzles, foam footballs and basketballs, frisbees, hacky sacks, playing cards, yo-yos, Sunday comics, coloring books and colored pencils

OTHER HELPFUL ITEMS — large rolls of "gaffers" tape in black green and tan (like duct tape but fabric) *matte finish only* — *not shiny*; Batteries (no lithium) size AA & D are in high demand

WRITING MATERIALS — notepaper, stationary, envelopes, pens pencils and stamps

NO chocolate, chocolate chip cookies, alcohol, anything that would melt in the desert heat.

#### **Foundation Approves Ten Grants**

- The Richardson Symphony Orchestra will receive a \$1,000 grant to support Symphony Days Program, which introduces approximately 4,200 RISD students to the world of classical music.
- **Hope's Door/New Beginning** received a \$500 grant to support a program for local youth that empowers them to foster healthy relationship and to reduce victimization and abuse.
- The Veterans Center of North Texas will use their \$1,000 grant to assist North Texas veteran and their families integrate into the community and to provide emergency financial assistance to veterans.
- **Unlocking DOORS** is a community resource network committed to improving public safety by reducing repeat crime for former offenders. The \$1,000 grant will help reduce recidivism among clients served.
- The \$1,000 grant for **Richardson Reads One Book** will assist in bringing a best-selling author to Richardson. The project brings community members together to read and discuss the book selected.
- The ESL for Parents Project at the **Richardson Adult Literacy Center** will receive \$1,000 to help parents learn English so they can engage in their children's education and become involved in the community.

- The Eisemann Center Foundation's Grant of \$1,000 will expand outreach initiatives in the community for students and will provide tickets to those who may not have access to the performing arts.
- Camp John Marc Special Camps for Special Kids received a \$500 grant to provide a unique camping experience for children and teenagers with cancer who interact with medical teams in a casual setting.
- Camp Summit's Campership and Financial Assistance Project received a \$500 grant, which provides financial aid to individuals with disabilities for a week-long camping session.
- The Senior Holiday Basket Program at Network of Community Ministries received a \$500 grant. This provides low-income seniors with food, toiletries and shelf stable food and clothing.





#### December U.N. Days and Other Observances

World AIDS Day, December 1, 2018: Significant progress has been made in the AIDS response since 1988, and today three in four people living with HIV know their status. But we still have miles to go, as the latest UNAIDS report shows, and that includes reaching people living with HIV who do not know their status and ensuring that they are linked to quality care and prevention services. HIV testing is essential for expanding treatment and ensuring that all people living with HIV can lead healthy and productive lives. It is also crucial to achieving the 90–90–90 targets and empowering people to make



choices about HIV prevention so they can protect themselves and their loved ones.

Human Rights Day is observed every year on 10 December – the day the United Nations General Assembly adopted, in 1948, the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u>. This year, Human Rights Day marks the <u>70th anniversary</u> of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, a milestone document that proclaimed the inalienable rights which everyone is inherently entitled to as a human being – regardless of race, color, religion, sex, language, politi-

cal or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. It is the most translated document in the world, available in more than 500 languages.

"Where, after all, do universal human rights begin? In small places, close to home — so close and so small that they cannot be seen on any maps of the world. [...] Unless these rights have meaning there, they have little meaning anywhere. Without concerted citizen action to uphold them close to home, we shall look in vain for progress in the larger world." — Eleanor Roosevelt

#### DISTRICT NINE ACCENT

#### What is a Leader?

A leader is a visionary, someone who sees the big picture in infinite possibilities for success. But the vision must include a plan of action, and this demand's organizational skills. A leader is a communicator who gives direction in understandable language with clear and specific steps to follow. Effective leaders are motivators and supporters, helping individuals reach their potential. Leaders in a volunteer organization are often negotiators because of the challenges faced by members.

A visionary Altrusa leader is flexible and not afraid of change. They encourage clubs to try new strategies for membership growth; change fundraisers when members' enthusiasm wanes or sufficient funds cannot be raised. A visionary leader sees the value of change, which can stimulate interest in long term members and attract the interest of potential members. But visions must have plans; a good leader develops a plan to make the vision a reality. "The very essence of leadership is that you have to have vision. You can't blow an uncertain trumpet." Theodore M. Hesburgh

Effective leaders communicate expectations to members. Some communicate more effectively in writing, others are best in a public setting, and others are most comfortable with one on one communication. But all leaders must clearly share their goals and expectations with members. The best leaders use various approaches to communicate since members understand and respond differently to written and spoken messages. The only message that matters is the one received so a successful leader makes certain that the listener understands.

Altrusa leaders motivate members to fulfill their obligations as officers and committee members. They encourage members to do their best and provide necessary guidance so that those individuals are successful. This builds confidence and a willingness to assume other responsibilities within the organization. Altrusa is "builder of women" and the effective leader assumes this responsibility and offers support to members. "In organizations, real power and energy is generated through relationships.
