Richardson Reads One Book this year: Remarkably Bright Creatures by Shelby Van Pelt was a sell-out.


OWT is coming up fast. We have wonderful sponsors and great raffle items. Our honorees are exceptional. Everyone is doing a fine job and I hope to see you all there.

The dominance of Mayan culture within its interior uplands distinguishes the country from its Central American neighbors.

The origin of the name Guatemala is Mayan, but its derivation and meaning are somewhat undetermined. Some hold that the original form was Quauhtemallan (indicating an Aztec rather than a Mayan origin), meaning "land of trees, " and others hold that it is derived from Guhatezmalha, meaning "mountain of vomiting water"— referring no doubt to such volcanic eruptions as the one that destroyed Santiago de los Caballeros de Guatemala (modern-day Antigua Guatemala).

MY COMMUNITY Santa Avelina is a community of approximately 600 families, that is located between the mountains, in San Juan Cotzal, 340 kilometers away from Guatemala City. The native language of Santa Avelina is Ixil, The weather is around 70 Fahrenheit over the year, the main economic activity is agriculture

LANGUAGES Guatemala's official language is Spanish, spoken by 93 percent of the population as either the first or second language but twenty-two Mayan languages are spoken plus Xinca and Garífuna, especially in rural areas.

Altrusa International Convention 2023 Conference Report No Child Sold – Raising Awareness with Ransomed Life

The keynote speakers at the 2023 Altrusa International Convention were inspiring, entertaining, lively, and informative. But when Susan Burkholder, Director of Community Awareness for Ransomed Life, spoke to us about the number of minors and young adults- over 79,000 just in the state of Texas- who are victims of sex trafficking, the room grew emotionally uncomfortable and quiet.

Many of us were even more shocked to discover that a lot of these victims had been good students from good families, with 40-50% being young males. We learned about common strategies of child predicators using technology, gaming sites, and social media to lure in these children and the lies they tell to keep them emotionally "captive". It was also surprising to learn that many of these young victims are not runaways, as is often assumed, but still live at home. They typically will continue to return home each night and school most days until either they become more deeply enslaved, are rescued, or choose suicide as a way to end their unbearable situation.

The mission of this commendable organization is to create awareness, offer counseling programs for victims and their families, and prevent sex trafficking by providing education about sexual exploitation to parents, guardians, children, schools, youth organizations, and medical professionals.

As Altrusans, we can also use *our* voices to increase awareness. Each of us can support their mission and help prevent these ever-growing numbers of victims of child sex-trafficking by simply going to their web site, www.ransomedlifetexas.org. There we can learn more about the warning signs, and how to protect our youth by reporting anything suspicious...any time...anywhere. Let's have conversations with our families, friends, and others in our community. Let's join the fight to stop this crime.
